



Proclamation Request

WHEREAS, the authority to decide the medical use of controlled substances is retained by the states; and

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii lawfully exercised this authority when it adopted Act 228, Session Laws of Hawaii 2000, and created a state-regulated medical use of cannabis program; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court confirmed this authority when it found in *Gonzales v. Oregon*, 546 U.S. 243 (2006), that “[t]he Attorney General has rulemaking power to fulfill his duties under the CSA. The specific respects in which he is authorized to make rules, however, instruct us that he is not authorized to make a rule declaring illegitimate a medical standard for care and treatment of patients that is specifically authorized under state law”; and

WHEREAS, Governor Cayetano signed Hawaii’s Medical Use of Cannabis Act into law on June 14, 2000; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Justice and the Drug Enforcement Administration have never challenged the constitutionality of Hawaii’s Medical Use of Cannabis Act; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii’s Medical Use of Cannabis Program has enabled tens of thousands of patients with debilitating medical conditions to benefit from the personal medical use of cannabis under medical supervision in Hawaii for the past twenty years;

THEREFORE I, DAVID Y. IGE, Governor, and I, JOSHUA B. GREEN, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii, do hereby proclaim June 14, 2020 as

“MEDICAL CANNABIS DAY”

in Hawaii and ask the people of the Aloha State to join us in recognizing the twentieth anniversary of the medical use of cannabis in Hawaii.
